## Mount Monadnock Trip

Congratulations to the 26 scouts and 8 adults who hiked up and down Mount Monadnock this weekend. All scouts will receive credit for gaining 1,000 feet in elevation on a campout for the Camping merit badge, and those scouts needing the 5 mile hike with compass instruction for Second Class will also receive credit. For the record, the group with mostly younger scouts hiked just under 8 miles and made it to the tree line at about 2,750 feet. The group with the more senior scouts covered about 9 miles and made it to just under the 3,165 foot summit mark before turning back due to time constraints. With no serious injuries to report, it makes for a successful hike, but for future hikes I would strongly suggest that several scouts and adults need to be better prepared with their choice of gear and water rations.

Thanks goes out to Mr. Dumont, Mr. Munger and Mr. Preble who prepared dinner while we were hiking, and thanks also to Mr. Conway for the homemade meatballs and sausages. A great job was done by the scouts for the Saturday night campfire, so all in all it was a great trip to kick off the 2010-2011 scout year.

## **Weather and Campouts**



Last Friday, the decision was made to postpone our departure for Mount Monadnock from Friday night to Saturday morning. The decision was made due to high winds, flood warnings and advisories in the Mount Monadnock area and the areas we would be traveling through. It was NOT postponed simply because it was raining. Safety is always the determining factor. As most of you know, Troop 9 camps in all types of weather, so a little rain or wet ground would not have stopped us from heading to New Hampshire Friday night.

At Thursday night's meeting, the latest weather reports had the storm hitting us with heavy rains and winds overnight on Thursday and into early Friday afternoon. The forecasts for the Mount Monadnock area had the storm clearing out by noon on Friday so there was no reason to delay our departure at that time. Obviously that changed when the storm still had not arrived by Friday morning. As we always do, we checked the various weather forecasts and travel advisories, and based on those it was quickly decided that travel conditions Friday night were going to be too dangerous to drive to New Hampshire.

We try to make the best decision at the earliest time possible based on the information we have at the time, knowing it will impact the dozens of scouts and adults in Troop 9 and their families. Sometimes Mother Nature doesn't cooperate with us in order to make the right decision Thursday night.
